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or social media. But to say the era of 2014-2017 was a blog wasteland, is putting it mildly. Like a pit in the desert in the middle of Death Valley. Blogs, as a thing, a trend, was as finished as the old media they had once conquered.

What changed?

Upsets and continued tension at Twitter - it was basically known by 2018 that Twitter wouldn't "go back to how it used to be". Facebook was under intense scrutiny (rightfully so) from the revelations in the book "Mindf***: Cambridge Analytica and the Plot to Break America", causing many to leave (or begin flirting with leaving) large social media platforms.

The platforms remaining, or the one with the most headway - Mastodon. Mastodon was mostly new in 2017, growing in popularity throughout 2017, 2018 due to people quitting Twitter en masse because of the turmoil there. Mastodon offered a decentralized and ad-free alternative. When people saw that if they wrote a blog post and shared it on Mastodon, it would be read (yes, READ by people and not spat into an algorithmic void!) and that others there would reply to their entry. It showed that Mastodon was a legitimate and truly organic alternative to the most social media before it. With this new blogging dynamic in mind (*brand* new to some), the "publish > share > feedback > publish > repeat" practice, stoked confidence and encouragement for the new (or new again) blogger. So grow the blogs did. And still do. Webrings, blogrolls, weekly, bi-weekly, and even daily bloggers sprawl the WWW. To the numbers comparable to the early-2000's? I don't know. Who cares? It's a great thing (blogging), comparisons don't matter. Numbers don't matter. Money and advertisements don't matter. Ambiguity from centralized platforms, sustaining personal privacy, having a true hub and voice online - these things matter.

Twitter Tensions, Mindf***, and the Mastodon in the Room by ~loghead

In 2018 blogging saw a renaissance. Another in 2020 (thin silver lining due to the pandemic), and yet another in 2022 (look through blogs these days, SO many started in 2022). But 2018 was the start. The re-(re)-introduction of the blogroll amongst weekly bloggers. The cozying up to writing about one's personal life (online). The flirting with Webrings, and spread of them. All this saw a spread of small, independent blogs that previous to 2018, didn't exist.

Rewind: 2014 and going into 2015, blogging was entering a vapid wasteland. People wrote online still, but less so than 2012. WAY less than 2010. Further back still, a small fraction remained of the early-ought bloggers and their respective domains. I had just left the "pro" blogging world, writing of celebs and tabloids. It was there I cut my teeth on daily writing, and also needing the post to be readable/shareable at time of publishing. Few typos, formatted decently, not slopped out gibberish. And nearly a dozen of them (blog posts) a day, to keep the advertising money coming in, on two separate publications. When social media took the helm (of attention, traffic, readership and ad sales), I left the pro blog world and started an online journal/diary on Tumblr - tomskee.com. It was on here that I explored journaling online, personal blogging. I updated the blog daily, with the same length and frequency of every post as I had been doing when writing for ad dollars. This was 2011, and then into 2012, 2013, 2014, but by 2015 I saw many many MANY more people becoming power users of social media. In lieu of their once-sacred domiciles online, their blog.

Namely Twitter. Influencers had gone full-tilt and streamlined their "brand" on their social network of choice. People had become openly acknowledging of the fact that blogs were less present online (some said "blogs are dead!") as well as RSS (makes sense at the time - without blogs what all can one subscribe to on RSS?), and people seemed content, or maybe complacent, with just using social feeds for news, activity. Not 100% of course. Many (including myself) trudged on, blogging aimlessly and keeping social media at the furthest distance possible. Though some never explored either category, blogs

What I'm talking about is the fact that we can no longer trust the wider web to be more than a manufactured echo chamber where people are told what to think and not how to think.

Yet while one might believe that things are becoming more unified with less choice in that the door has been slammed on startups and the existing platforms are courting money and lawmakers specifically to shut down competition in their niches? Within those platforms, people are made demonstrably less mentally well. Constant 'my in-group is being assaulted. Kick at people I already didn't like! Raaaaah' sort of reducing everything to sports-ball like tribalism with the added 'twist' that actual out-groups and minority voices are being shoved around while given the thin veneer of acceptance in select non threatening spaces, or in ways specifically crafted to enrage other groups into pointing at them rather than at the people in charge.

Yes, there is the problem that without running through an increasingly convoluted set of hoops, Google and other large mail couriers auto flag the email addresses as spam, but they can receive mail from most anyone, and there is a tilde-based Usenet type server going, an internet radio station, a mess of game servers, and other niceties available to the wider community beyond the means of just one server to provide.

So while it is not for everyone. It is a place that leverages being somehow stuck in time to avoid the downhill rut that everything seems to be going down. As with every community, it has its own issues and quirks, but that is part of the human condition.

Digital Independence

Bit of an oxymoron there. We want to be independent in a medium that by its nature is all about connections. So, narrow that down. Independent of what?

We're never going to be completely independent of ISP's without a complete fragmentation into the era of what one can connect to locally. In the past that was via direct phone dialing.
