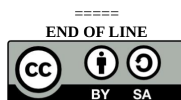

File Name convention
.[Year]-[Month]-zine

Thanks to Gome I can use either of the following scripts to search for what matches the current month's dot files. This hopefully leaves everything clear on what users wish to share and, truthfully, it lends itself to a democratization of things. I'm just the editor, you want to take a hand at compiling, or want to try something? Here ya go, same data I'm pulling from.f

As for art? While this does not directly allow getting art to me one can still provide links via the month's dot files in a way that I know what out of a long list of recent projects actually happened in the past month.

Gome's Dotfile Scripts

To display everything as a codified thing.
~gome/scripts/dotshare-digest

To display a list of files.
~gome/scripts/check-dotshare

I include links for the sake of transparency, and in the hope others can do something interesting with them. Dotfiles provide an interesting way to share data within the server if everyone participating can agree on things like naming convention and how to present data within the file itself.

Further Discussion

Please do not feel like this is a 'done' thing. As with much in the server this is just an experiment. It may fizzle or thrive. I just saw a problem of 'i do not see many people submitting content. I do not want the zine to stop being a monthly thing if at all reasonably possible. How do I do that ethically?'

Short Shell Scripts

Editor's Note: *This actually was supposed to be in October's issue of Ctrl-Zine, but I failed to cvcheck my ctrl-c mailbox while doing final compilation for October. Again, apologies to pgadey for the snarl.*

One of the joys of using Linux is writing really short shell scripts that do just one thing. They're so short that they barely count as "programming".

I think that people are hesitant to share them because they're often so terse and fragile. However, I always love seeing when other people share their little hacks.

One nice reference to this sort of stuff is [datagubbe's](https://www.datagubbe.se/bestofbash/) page [best of .bashrc](https://www.datagubbe.se/bestofbash/).

In hopes of encouraging more of sharing this sort of stuff, I'll write up a couple of them.

Here are some of my hacks, and how they came to be.
For the past few months, I have had to do daily physio exercises. They're boring and tedious, and each of them needs to be done for a certain duration each day. To help with the timing, I use `ffplay` to ring a bell for me. It took a little while to sort out the options to run it optimally, but I wound up with the follow "physio timer".

```
sleep 120;
ffplay -nodisp -autoexit bell.wav >/dev/null 2>&1;
```

Recently, I found myself with a handful of papers to grade quickly.
I wanted to spend at most five minutes per paper, so that I could get them done in time.
And so, I asked my computer: "Please ring a bell every five minutes, and tell me to move on."
Adding a single loop to the "physio timer" made a "paper grading timer".

```
while true;
do
ffplay -nodisp -autoexit bell.wav >/dev/null 2>&1;
echo "Keep moving!";
sleep 300;
done
```

Certainly, someone somewhere has written something really nice for this kind of task. But, I wrote something quick and dirty and that put a smile on my face.

Here is another one.
Recently, I came across a hacker through the [merveilles webring](https://webring.xxiivv.com/) who listed their e-mail as a base64 encoded string together with a one-liner to decode it. (I'm really sorry, but I've forgotten their name and e-mail. If anyone knows this person, or can track them down, please let me know. I could not find them through [Lieuj](https://lieu.cblgh.org/).)

I thought that was a really nice idea.

It was like they were saying "If you're willing to run this one-liner on your computer, then I trust you and we should chat."
This got me thinking how I would produce my own such decode-this-on-your-machine one-liner. Want to encode some text in base64 and then give people a Unix one-liner to decode it? Look no further!

```
echo "echo \"$(echo "INSERT YOUR TEXT HERE" | base64)\"| base64 --decode"
```

So, there is an encoder that produces decoders. There is a Lewis Carroll / Alice in Wonderland vibe about this hack that I enjoy. Sometimes, these little shell scripts are so small that we just make aliases in `.bashrc`. There is a humour to this last one. Everytime I use it, I smile.

```
alias goodnight="sudo shutdown now"
```
